

Digital Governance: EU-FAO Hands Over GIS Equipment to Homa Bay County to Boost Land Governance and Development

e are delighted to announce that Homa Bay County has officially received cutting-edge Geographic Information System (GIS) equipment, generously provided by the European Union and the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations. This significant initiative, spearheaded by Mr. Hamisi Williams. the Deputy FAO Representative to Kenya, is a crucial component of the EU-FAO funded Digital Governance Programme. programme is designed to enhance food and nutrition security by improving land tenure and driving sustainable development in alignment with Kenya's Vision 2030.

"As a county, we will harness GIS technology to effectively map, monitor, and manage our resources," stated Governor Gladys Wanga during the ceremonial signing of the delivery particulars with Mr. Williams at her office. Department of Education, Human Capital Development and Vocational Training, in partnership with Sightsavers, successfully convened an inception meeting for the Technical Working Group tasked with reviewing and developing key policies legislative frameworks aimed advancing inclusive education and disability rights within Homa Bay County.



The primary focus of this initiative is the formulation of the Homa Bay County Disability Act, Homa Bay County Disability Policy, and the Homa Bay County Inclusive Early Years Education Policy and Act.

These measures are designed to create an enabling environment that recognises and values diversity, reduces barriers to participation, and promotes social integration for all children and persons with disabilities.

In his opening remarks, Mr.Joseph Goga, the County EYE Director, emphasised the significance of these policies: "Our goal is to foster an inclusive society where every child, regardless of their abilities, has access to quality education and equal opportunities. County's Food Security Plans Move to Climate-Smart Approaches

Homa Bay Rolls Out Climate-Smart Agriculture Project in 28 Wards



he County Government of Homa Bay, through the Department Agriculture, Irrigation, and Livestock Development, in partnership with the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO), has taken a bold step towards building climate-smart agriculture. The two institutions convened one-day with sensitisation meetina Ward Agricultural Officers to roll out the Green Climate Fund (GCF) Project, which will be implemented in 28 selected wards across the county.

The project seeks promote to climate-resilient, low-carbon, and agricultural sustainable value technologies that will enable farmers to mitigate and adapt to the adverse effects of climate change while boosting food security and household incomes. Priority value chains identified for implementation include coffee integrated with fruit trees, African leafy vegetables, and dairy production.

To bring these innovations closer to farmers, the project will adopt the Farmer Field School (FFS) approach, an interactive, hands-on learning model that allows farmers to learn, practice, and share new techniques directly in their fields. The initiative is expected to transform local agriculture, foster resilience to climate shocks, and unlock new opportunities for growth within the farming sector.

Speaking during the meeting, Homa Bay Governor and CECM Deputy Agriculture, Irrigation, and Livestock Development, H.E. Joseph Ovuai Magwanga, emphasised the county's commitment to empowering farmers through climate-smart interventions. "Our farmers are at the frontline of climate change, and it is our responsibility to equip them with the tools, skills, and knowledge they need to thrive.



Through this partnership with FAO, we are confident that the Green Climate Fund Project will not only enhance agricultural productivity but also improve livelihoods and secure the future of farming in Homa Bay," he said.

The rollout of the Green Climate Fund Project aligns with Governor Gladys Wanga's development agenda, which prioritises sustainable agriculture and climate resilience as pillars of Homa Bay's economic growth. The county seeks to not only secure food systems but also position agriculture as a driver of prosperity and long-term environmental sustainability.



County Receives 7 Tons of Sunflower Seeds Subsidy Programme

hrough the Edible Oil Crops Promotion Project (EOCPP), Agriculture and Food Authority has allocated 7 tonnes of sunflower seeds to Homa Bay County for distribution to farmers under a subsidy model of buy one, get one free, at a cost of KSh. 385 per kilogram. The variety being promoted is Fedha, sourced from Kenya Seed Company.

The Department of Agriculture, Irrigation and Livestock Development, in collaboration with the Agriculture and Food Authority (AFA) convened a one-day sensitization meeting with Sub-County Agricultural Officers (SCAOs) and Ward Agricultural Officers (WAOs). The focus of the meeting was to deliberate on the promotion of edible oil crops value chains, specifically sunflower, soybeans, and groundnuts.

As part of the project's implementation strategy, efforts are underway to organize farmers into Common Interest Groups (CIGs), which will then evolve into Farmer Groups to champion the production and development of the targeted value chains.

The meeting also brought on board key stakeholders, including representatives from the Cereal Growers Association (CGA), which plays a critical role in farmer representation. provision of technical support, market linkages, dissemination of agricultural information. In addition, Mama Millers participated as an important value chain actor, taking up the role of off-takers of sunflower produce from farmers.

In her closing remarks, the Chief Officer for Agriculture and Irrigation, Ms. Ombok Judith, expressed gratitude to the AFA team for their support. She reaffirmed that the county has prioritized the promotion of oil crops as part of efforts to bridge the national deficit in the edible oil sector. Ms. Ombok emphasized that this is why sunflower production continues to receive keen attention from the county.

She further appealed to Mama Millers to complement government efforts by stepping in as reliable partners and off-takers, noting that while the 7 tonnes allocated is a good start, it will not be sufficient to meet the needs of all farmers.

This collaborative initiative is expected to boost the edible oil sector in Homa Bay by enhancing farmer capacity, strengthening value chain linkages, and creating sustainable market opportunities for oil crops.



At the far western end lies the newly established Homa Bay Modern Fish Market, which not only showcases the rich aquatic bounty of the region but also serves as a vibrant hub for local fishmongers and talented artisans.

The lakefront recently played host to its inaugural major event at the amphitheater, where an enthusiastic crowd of sports fans gathered to witness a thrilling match in which Kenya triumphed over Zambia. This victory significantly boosted their chances of advancing as group winners in the recently concluded African Nations Championship tournament, co-hosted with Uganda and Tanzania.





The event was a spectacular display of community spirit and pride, surpassing all previously established sports fan zones in the country and earning recognition throughout East Africa.

Adding to its allure, the Homa Bay Lakefront now features the Golden Spot Club, a charming beachfront bar and restaurant that offers a diverse menu brimming with enticing African cuisines. Visitors can unwind with refreshing drinks as they bask in stunning sunsets glimmering over the Ruri hills, creating a picturesque atmosphere that beckons relaxation and a deep connection with nature.

The pier has quickly become a beloved location for outdoor photography enthusiasts, who flock to capture the captivating landscapes and vibrant life surrounding the lake, further solidifying the Lakefront as a must-visit destination in the region.
