PRESIDENTIAL TOUR: PRESIDENT, AND GOVERNOR PRESIDE OVER THE COMMISSIONING OF KEY PROJECTS ACROSS THE COUNTY

The latest visit by President Dr William Ruto yielded several integral people-centric projects aimed at transforming the lives of the people of Homa Bay County. The president was visiting for the second time this year to inspect and launch the projects funded jointly by the State, County government and development partners.

Joined by Governor Gladys Wanga, President Ruto first commissioned the Oyugis Water Supply and Sanitation Project at Atemo, Kojwach ward. The 12,300m³ capacity water treatment and supply plant aims to provide clean and safe water to over 11,000 households in Rachuonyo South and East sub-counties, and more specifically in Oyugis, Ringa and Kosele trading centers and surrounding areas. The project, delivered a decade later after it was commissioned is part of the five-part flagship water projects in the county which also has Kendu Bay, West Karachuonyo, Homa Bay Wastewater and Last Mile Project and Mbita-Ndhiwa-Homa Bay Cluster Project, all targeting over 78,500 beneficiary households in the county.

The Homa Bay Modern Fish Market is an ambitious project that is focused on overhauling the handling of fish value chain in the county and beyond. Built to accommodate the landing, storage, processing and selling of fish, the market at Koginga Beach in Homa Bay Town is a transformative project that on completion will help spur the economic growth of the entire lake region. President Ruto and his delegation inspected the ongoing works at the site and commended the progress with a forecast completion before the turn of the year.

Additionally, the rehabilitation of the Homa Bay Port impressed the Head of State, taking the cue from Governor Gladys Wanga that the full potential and readiness of Homa Bay Town being a city relies on how soon the town can be transformed into the region's transport and logistical hub. The revival of the lake transport will contribute immensely in restoring the economic growth within Homa Bay and beyond.

In Rusinga Island, the president flagged the construction of the 42km Rusinga Island Ring

Road. The road will complete the linkage between the Island and Mbita Point mainland, enhancing trading and movement of people and goods thus stimulating economic growth in Suba North region. Roads remain the county's main ask from the national government and the construction of

GOVERNANCE: EXTENSIVE PUBLIC PARTICIPATION ON ANNUAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN (C-ADP) FOR 2025-2026 ENDS WITH PRIORITY PROJECTS SUGGESTED

he County Government of Homa Bay successfully concluded a comprehensive public participation exercise for the Annual Development Plan (C-ADP) 2025-2026. This pivotal two-day event, which took place across all 40 wards, was aimed at gathering insights and priorities from residents and stakeholders to guide the county's development agenda for the upcoming financial year.

The exercise covered several crucial sectors that are central to the county's growth and development with residents prioritizing the provision of farm inputs and tractors for the Agriculture, Rural and Urban Development sector and opening, grading, gravelling, and culverting of roads to improve access and support other activities as well as piping and solar installation at water points to ensure reliable water supply and sustainable energy solutions as part of the Energy, Infrastructure, and ICT Development sector.

Further, under General Economic and Commercial Affairs (Trade) the residents identified upgrading of markets as a key priority to boost local commerce and economic activities while there was also a strong emphasis on provision of learning and playing materials in all Early Years Education (EYE) Centers to enhance the quality of education. Construction and refurbishment of health facilities were identified as critical for improving access to healthcare services.

On Social Protection, Culture, and Recreation, upgrading playgrounds and providing sports items were noted as important for promoting social wellbeing and nurturing talent among the youth. Piping projects and solar installations at water points were underscored as essential for environmental sustainability and resource management dominated the Environmental Protection, Water, and Natural Resources sector.

The participation exercise brought together a

diverse group of participants, including the general public, residents, persons abled differently, youths, civil society organizations, and various interest groups. Their input is invaluable in shaping the county's development priorities, ensuring that the plans reflect the needs and aspirations of the community.

The feedback collected during this exercise will be instrumental in prioritizing projects and initiatives by the County Government of Homa Bay. By incorporating the views and priorities of the residents, the county aims to implement development projects that are not only effective but also resonate with the needs of the people.

Recognizing the critical role of public participation in development and policy planning, the exercise was conducted in alignment with the Constitution of Kenya, 2010, Article 220(2), and the Public Finance Management Act, 2012, Section 126. This commitment is further reinforced by Articles 1, 69(d) and 201 of the Constitution and Section 207 of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012, which emphasize the importance of involving the public in decision-making processes.

PARTNERSHIPS: GOVERNOR WANGA INKS MOU ON STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS TO ENHANCE SERVICE DELIVERY

MOU WITH SHOFCO TO FOCUS ON SOCIAL SERVICES ACROSS SECTORS

E Governor Gladys Wanga put pen to paper to cement a social service partnership plan with the Shining Hope for Communities NGO. This Memorandum of Understanding makes the two entities to collaborate on transformative projects in education, healthcare, water and sanitation, economic empowerment, and youth development with both focusing on shared goals meant to uplift urban and rural communities by improving access to essential services and empowering youth to create sustainable futures.

Homa Bay County has been working with SHOFCO over four broad critical areas: Healthcare, Water and Sanitation, Education and Youth Empowerment, Gender and prevention of sexual abuse.

SHOFCO's approach to community development

is holistic, addressing multiple dimensions of poverty and inequality to create lasting change. Its programs focus on education, healthcare, water and sanitation, economic empowerment, community mobilization, and youth development, all aimed at improving the well-being and opportunities for residents in urban slums and rural areas.

SHOFCO and Homa Bay County have agreed to work together in areas of agriculture, water, environment, gender, health, education, and youth and women empowerment programmes in an initial five-year program that will oversee SHOFCO is sponsoring 250 TVET students in Homa Bay County Others will be the establishment of water pans, safe houses for victims of sexual abuse, and resource centers for the communities among other key interventions.

he Memorandum with Understanding signed the Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) over the last month will allow a collaboration on creating the first County Statistical Abstract (CSA). This will enable the government to collect and provide comprehensive information on various sectors of the economy at the county and lower levels for planning, development, and improving our service delivery to the people of Homa Bay County.

Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) is a State Corporation established by the Statistics Act, 2006 and mandated to do the collection, compilation, analysis, publication and dissemination of statistical information, coordination of the national statistical system and offer custody for official government statistics. Part of its mandate is to offer county governments and other state agencies with technical support in developing their statistical abstracts.

of The County Statistical Abstract (CSA) is a publication on available statistics on the demographic, social, governance, economic and environment of a county; with data from Departments and Agencies based in the counties (National & County Government). While making a case for her administration to develop its own CSA, Governor Gladys Wanga pointed out the gaps that exist in the running of the county due to lack of or insufficient data to rely on when making key decisions, especially within the financial planning spectrum.

While presenting the scope of the work KNBS will be undertaking Director General Dr Macdonald George Obudho, EBS, MBS said other than the overarching goal of better coverage, standards, and continuous improvement, collaboration between KNBS and the County Governments will emphasize Committees at the County levels, County Governments to collect data from its Departments,

KNBS to collect data from National Government and offer technical guidance/assistance with a plan to producing the CSA annually.

Homa Bay County joins Samburu, Siaya, Busia, Nandi and Uasin Gishu as the counties currently developing their first CSAs while Laikipia, Makueni, Kericho, Uasin Gishu, Nyandarua and Nakuru are onto their secondgeneration CSAs.

FOCUS ON THE MUNICIPALITIES – OYUGIS MUNICIPALITY

With a population of approximately 53,433, including 9,084 classified as urban, Oyugis is an important urban center in the area. It falls under the administrative jurisdiction of Kasipul Constituency, along with Kabondo-Kasipul. The town comprises five County Assembly wards: West Kamagak, East Kamagak, West Kasipul, Central Kasipul, and South Kasipul. Administratively, Oyugis is part of Kasipul division, which, together with Kabondo, forms the Rachuonyo South District.

Oyugis town was duly conferred the status of a Municipality and issued with a Charter on 9th January 2023 by the Governor of Homa Bay County, Her Excellency Gladys Nyasuna Wanga, EGH, CBS, under Section 9(1) of the Urban Areas and Cities Act 2011. Consequently, the Oyugis Municipal Board was duly constituted and the Municipal Manager appointed under Section 14 of the Urban Areas and Cities Act 2011 on 4th May 2023 and section 29 of the Urban Areas and Cities Act 2011 respectively.

The Manager, in consultation with the board has the key mandate to oversee the day-to-day operations of the Municipality under sections 28 (2), and (3) of the Oyugis Municipal Charter. Since

its establishment, the Oyugis Municipal Board has implemented key infrastructural projects and fostered community involvement to drive growth and improve the quality of life for its residents.

Achievements of the Oyugis Municipal Board

Oyugis Municipality has achieved notable milestones that have already begun transforming the town into a model of urban progress. One of the most visible achievements has been the installation of 84 state-of-the-art streetlights and a pedestrian walkway from DTB Bank to Winimum Hotel. The improvements have enhanced safety and security, while also showcasing Oyugis' commitment to urban infrastructure.

Furthermore, the Board has successfully organized five public forums and one major stakeholder dialogue with key players, including KCB and Equity Bank. These forums have fostered a culture of community engagement and dialogue, empowering local residents to contribute to the town's future. In addition, a 54-member diaspora committee dedicated to resource mobilization has been established to leverage external support for local initiatives.

The Municipality has also prioritized social cohesion through efforts such as community reconciliation at Athousand Street and organized clean-up campaigns in CBD. These initiatives have reduced waste accumulation, improved environmental hygiene, and fostered a sense of civic responsibility among residents. Additionally, the identification and marking of parking lots have contributed to decongesting the town center, creating a more orderly and pleasant environment for businesses and visitors alike.

Oyugis Municipality has also successfully joined joined the Covenant of Mayors in Sub-Saharan Africa (CoM SSA), committing to climate action, sustainability, and enhancing energy access for a healthier, greener, and resilient future. CoM SSA is co-funded by the European Union (EU), the German Federal Ministry of Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ), and the Agencia Española de Cooperación Internacional para el Desarrollo (AECID).

Economically, the inauguration of Rodi Kakuom Market has had a direct impact on promoting local business, empowering traders, and stimulating economic activity within the town.

The municipality has also successfully engaged owners of roaming animals in Oyugis, fostering collaboration to address the challenges posed by stray livestock. Through a series of community meetings and dialogues, the manager raised awareness about the negative impact of roaming animals on public spaces, safety, and cleanliness. His proactive approach led to the establishment of new regulations and enforcement measures, significantly reducing the number of stray animals. This achievement improved town orderliness.

Vision and Opportunities for the Future

Oyugis' achievements have paved the way for even greater opportunities in the future. The Municipality envisions a cleaner, more organized town that capitalizes on its strategic location along to attract investment and boost tourism. Cleanliness is not just an aesthetic goal; it has the potential to be a driving force behind Oyugis' economic transformation.

Drawing inspiration from cities like Kigali and Singapore, which have demonstrated the profound impact of cleanliness on urban development, Oyugis can implement strategies that improve public health, enhance the town's appeal, and attract both tourists and investors. Kigali, renowned for its commitment to cleanliness and community involvement, has become a thriving center for international conferences, while Singapore's clean and green policies have made it a global financial hub.

Oyugis can emulate these successes through public awareness campaigns that emphasize the economic benefits of cleanliness. Infrastructure investments, such as pedestrian walkways, tree planting, and designated motorbike parking areas, will not only beautify the town but also improve mobility, reduce congestion, and boost air quality. Relocating hawkers to a designated market area and maintaining regular clean-up campaigns can streamline the town's appearance and attract more visitors and businesses.
