### SURVEY: HOMA BAY COUNTY NOW LEADING FROM THE TOP

oma Bay County has emerged as a topperforming county in terms of service delivery. This is according to a recent survey by renowned research and survey firm Infotrak. The survey ranked Trans Nzoia Governor George Natembeya (70%) and Homa Bay Governor Gladys Wanga (70%) as the best-performing county bosses.

Released in late October, the report highlighted that participants in the survey commended the two governors for their outstanding service delivery. Following closely behind were West Pokot Governor Simon Kachapin (67%), Kisii Governor Simba Arati (64%), and Murang'a Governor Irungu Kang'ata (64%).

The ranking revealed that first-term governors surpassed their second-term counterparts in terms of implementing key projects and development initiatives.

The County Track Survey, conducted between July and September, involved a sample size of 58,748 people from all 47 counties.

The assessment also recognized governors who had made notable improvements in comparison to their predecessors. Notably, Governor Gladys Wanga successfully elevated Homa Bay County from its previous position at 45th to become one of the two leading counties.

The ranking evaluated the performance of counties across different sectors, taking into account the impact of launched projects in areas such as healthcare, education, agriculture, and infrastructure.

Under Governor Wanga's leadership, Homa Bay County has witnessed significant transformation in terms of infrastructure development and service delivery. The governor prioritized healthcare, resulting in the restoration of the county's largest hospital to full operational capacity. This achievement includes the introduction of critical services such as a CT scan, top-tier maternity services, and the availability of pharmaceuticals.

Additionally, the governor addressed transportation and mobility issues by improving over 300km of rural roads to make them accessible. Leveraging donor funding, municipal roads within Homa Bay Town were also given attention.

The agricultural sector in the county experienced remarkable progress with the adoption of farm mechanization, farm input subsidies, and the revitalization of farmer cooperatives over the past year.

As Governor Wanga continues to fulfill her promise of making Homa Bay County competitive among other counties, she acknowledges the unwavering support from the county's residents. Their trust and expectations have motivated her to deliver on her campaign pledges.

# INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONSHIP: COUNTY AND NATIONAL GOVERNMENTS ON MUTUAL VISION

### PRESIDENT RUTO'S WHIRLWIND TOUR BRINGS DEVELOPMENT PROMISES

The highly-anticipated visit of President Ruto did happen, culminating in a visit to the Affordable Housing construction site in Homa Bay town. The President's packed schedule included various key stops throughout the county, highlighting his commitment to advancing development in the region.

The tour commenced with a historic visit to Mfangano Island in Suba Central, where President Ruto, accompanied by





Governor Gladys Wanga, became the first sitting president to set foot on the island. During his visit, the President launched the construction of a 53km island ring road, which will significantly enhance the transportation of goods and people within the expansive island. Furthermore, President Ruto expressed his support for the upgrading of Sena Level 4 Hospital, the establishment of a Coast Guards Base, an Island Water Purification system, a Fish Landing Bay at Wakula, the construction of Suba Central Sub-County headquarters at Sena, an Airstrip upgrade, and the acquisition of a government-funded public ferry.

Following this momentous occasion, the President proceeded to the renowned Victory Farms in Roo, Kaksingri West. Here, he presented the leading fish farming and fish value addition firm with a license, granting them the opportunity to expand their business operations to enhance production for both local and international markets. A public rally in Sindo Township followed, during which President Ruto unveiled the government's plan to replenish the lake with seven million fingerlings every month once the Kabonyo Fish Hatchery in Kisumu is fully operational.

Continuing his tour, the President's entourage traveled to Magunga, where he inaugurated the upgrade of the Sori-Kiabuya-Magunga-Sindo-Mbita road to bitumen standards. The tour's final stop was Homa Bay Town, where President Ruto participated in the groundbreaking ceremony for the rehabilitation of the pier.

Throughout his engagements, President Ruto reiterated his unwavering commitment to driving development in Homa Bay County. The President also unveiled several other initiatives, including the construction of modern markets in Ndhiwa, Rodi Kopanya, and Kendu Bay, the Kendu Bay Water Project, the continuation of the Adiedo-Namba Karabok-Oyugis Road, and the creation of additional affordable housing units across the county's five municipalities, among other promised benefits.

# **RIWA PARK TO TRANSFORM THE COUNTY FROM CONSUMPTION TO PRODUCTION**

oma Bay became the seventh county to launch the construction of an industrial and Aggregation Park. During the launch of the County Aggregation and Industrial Park at Riwa in Rachuonyo North sub-county, the then Trade, Investments, and Industry Cabinet Secretary (CS) Moses Kuria challenged county governments to prioritize industrial production as a way of promoting the local economies.

Kuria said governors should set targets for production and value the addition of diverse local produce to curb reliance on imports. This, he said, will address economic challenges and save the country's foreign exchange.

He hailed Governor Gladys Wanga for her commitment to the realization of industrial takeoff in the county, saying that it was in line with the government's transformation agenda.

The CS called on investors to establish firms to produce various products.

"Counties need to set targets to produce goods and compete among themselves. This is the only way they will be sustained," he said.

The CS was accompanied by Homa Bay Governor Gladys Wanga, Woman Representative Joyce Osogo, and Karachuonyo MP Adipo Okumu at the launch of the county industrial park, which measures 353 acres.

Homa Bay will use the facility to exploit the production of edible oil and cotton.

Already, farmers have expressed their willingness to produce crops such as oil palm that will be used in the production of edible oil.

Other crops that will be processed at the park include sweet potatoes, pineapple, and others. Mr. Kuria said some investors have already shown a willingness to set up firms at the park.

It includes an investor who wants to establish a cotton ginnery.

"Another investor wants to engage in fish production by making boats. It is an opportunity that the county government should take advantage of," the CS said.

Mr. Kuria encouraged local investors to set up industries within counties.

He said some people have been establishing firms in foreign countries when Kenya has few people doing the same. "With the industrial parks, there will be urban-rural migration. People will also move from the diaspora back to the country to invest," Mr. Kuria said.

Governor Wanga said the launch of the industrial park comes at a time when her administration is finalizing the registration of farmers.

She said Homa Bay has registered more than 220,000 farmers, which was so far the highest in the country. "After registration, the farmers will get subsidized farm inputs to enable them to realize maximum production," the governor said.

Meanwhile, she asked the contractor undertaking the project to consider local youth and women in the provision of labor.

She also called on the government to ensure roads to the industrial park are completed. It includes Oijo Oteko Road, where the contractor abandoned the site before completing the project. Another key road that supports the park is the Kanyadhiang-Pala-Kandiege-Kadel Ring Road.

"If they are done, we will be sure that goods will move with ease in and out of the park," Governor Wanga said.

Meanwhile, Governor Wanga has already initiated the process that will see Riwa Gazette as a special economic zone

# COUNTY TO BETTER MANAGE SOCIAL AUDIT ISSUES

oma Bay County Government has agreed to adopt a model policy for complaints handling from the Commission on Administrative Justice (CAJ). This follows a sensitization session that was organized for county chief officers and directors to educate them on the commission's mandate and its role in promoting access to information.

The sensitization session was held as part of the ongoing county engagements under the National Treasury's Financing Locally Led Climate Action (FLLOCA) program. Speaking during the forum, Director Access to Information at CAJ, Ms. Viola Ochola, said the commission was keen to help counties set up complaints resolution mechanisms. "We have a responsibility to ensure counties have a policy in place to handle complaints as the constitution requires," said Ms. Ochola.

Financing Locally Led Climate Action program representative, Mr. Simon Ochieng, said the handling of complaints at the county level has not always been very good. He applauded Homa Bay County for having already established ward climate committees and implementing climate action plans. He added that FLLOCA wants to help the county implement a structured way to handle issues at the sub-county level.

County chief officer for Public Communication who is also the county's designated Access to Information officer, Ms. Caroline Atieno, said the county administration is committed to developing a county-specific access to information law. She added that the county will continue to proactively provide and publicize information to the public through its key platforms and that it will soon be implementing a complaints resolution mechanism. She also committed to giving reports to CAJ by the 30th of June every year.

### WARD-BASED PROJECTS: COMMISSIONING OF COUNTY-FUNDED PROJECTS BEGIN ACROSS THE COUNTY

When H.E. Governor Gladys Wanga issued an internal memo calling for her government to meet to review the status of government-funded projects, there was one expected outcome – every project must run to a full course. After a roundtable meeting lasting the entire morning, it was resolved that the governor and her entire team would be moving from project to project, ward to ward, and sub-county to subcounty commissioning those projects while at the same time, various departments were tasked with the responsibility to ensure that the projects under them were not only complete but done to realize the value for money.

In the foregoing, The County Government of Homa Bay under the stewardship of Governor Gladys Wanga has embarked on launching county government-funded projects.

Starting with the Homa Bay Town constituency the Governor unveiled the County Cotton Aggregation Center and Tractor Transport for improved cotton marketing in Magare, Homa Bay West Ward. This project is significant to the county as it positions itself as a leader in the cotton value chain, having had several farmers registering as prospective cotton growers. The county government will make this facility a one-stop point for cotton value addition processes and a holding depot for the farmers.

In Homa Bay Arujo Ward, the government has unveiled the Lieta-Kabunde Primary School Water Project that will supply the school and the surrounding community. The Governor then commissioned a new maternity unit, staff houses, and an ablution block at Miniambo Health Center.

In the Rangwe Sub-County, she launched vital projects in Kochia, Kagan, Gem East, and Gem West. These projects include the Obengle - Junction Omoya Road, God Bondo Rural Water Supply Project, Olare-Dhok Mit Pipeline Water Supply in Kochia, Ndiru-Oriek Road in Kagan, Dago Dispensary in Gem East, and a modern staff building at Nyawawa Dispensary in Gem West. These projects reflect the Government's commitment to delivering quality services. The commissioning continues across all wards.

he county Government of Homa Bay in Collaboration with UNFPA, Mpesa Foundation, Amref Health Africa in Kenya, Beyond Zero, and Flying Doctors Society of Africa, supported a free Fistula camp through screening and surgery for Obstetric fistula (women with an inability to control urine, stool or both).

The free Fistula camp screening started on 14th October to 19th October 2023 in the nine subcounties. From 20th October to 26th October 2023, the medical team was at Homa Bay County Teaching and Referral Hospital performing corrective surgeries and treatment of all the patients who were found within the nine Sub-Counties. The services were also extended to patients outside Homa Bay County.

The camp has screened over 200 cases, 39 were cases referred for Physiotherapy, psychotherapy, and cancer treatment for suspected lesions, 85+ admissions 25 ongoing surgeries.

H.E Governor Gladys Wanga was

pleased to receive the guests from the supporting partners, who assured her of providing fistula repair kits and also transfer the skills to mid-wives and Communication health promoters.

"We are dedicated to making a significant impact and improving the lives of those affected by Fistula." Said H.E Gladys Wanga during her visit to the Homa Bay County Teaching and Referral Hospital, where she spent time with the beneficiaries of the Uzazi Salama program.

NHIF came in aid during the fistulafree camp to register the patients who did not have the NHIF to help them during the treatment.

"I thank the Homa Bay county Government H.E Governor Gladys Wanga for the wise decision she came up with by helping us who have been suffering for a long time from Fistula. Many of us are still under stigma and embarrassment making them not come out and be treated." said one of the patients

### **COUNTY LAUNCHES CLIMATE INFORMATION CENTER**

The County Government of Homa Bay has recently unveiled its Climate Information Center which will be used in collating, analyzing, packaging up, and distributing climate data on variables such as temperature, rainfall, wind, soil moisture, lake conditions, and extreme weather indicators.

While presiding over the function at the departmental offices of Energy, Forestry, and Climate Change, H.E Governor Gladys Wanga said this data will be crucial to farmers in the County to make the right decisions for their farming activities and to decision-makers and policymakers in the County. The center will also have other capabilities including serving as a call center for disaster risk management.

"The agro-weather information we shall be disseminating to our farmers and our fishermen will be crucial for them in enabling their proper planning and execution of their farm activities," the Governor said.

The Homa Bay County Climate Change Policy, 2022 recommends the use of appropriate technology for reliable data collection, analysis, and dissemination of climate information. This is integrated into the Homa Bay County Climate Change Action Plan 2023-2027 and has now been implemented in the form of the Homa Bay County Climate Information Center.

The technology infrastructure was provided by Tomorrow Now, a climate change tech service provider while the county government will be partnering with Kenya Agricultural and Livestock Research Organization (KALRO) in providing information to the farmers' on-farm practices and policies based on the climate and weather information generated by the Call Center.

### **COUNTY AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROJECT CERTIFIED CLIMATE SMART**

oma Bay County received an Excellence in Design for Greater Efficiency (EDGE) certificate for the first phase of the County's greenbuilt affordable housing project, becoming the first affordable Housing Program to be certified in Africa.

EDGE is an International green building certification platform, developed by the International Finance Corporation (IFC), the private sector arm of the World Bank that is focused on making buildings more resource-efficient. EDGE requires a minimum projected reduction of 20% of energy use, water use, and embodied carbon in materials as benchmarked e event, Gard local building. Speaking during the event, Governor Wanga expressed her gratitude to the IFC and stressed that the certification confirms that her administration is committed to providing solutions to housing problems in compliance with set standards.

She added that the housing units will not only provide low-income residents in Homa Bay County with an opportunity to own decent houses but will also be a source of employment for hundreds of locals including carpenters, masons, electricians, plumbers, and painters, among others.

IFC county representative Evans Kamau congratulated Homa Bay County for being the first affordable housing program to be certified in Africa and urged Governor Wanga to continue leading other certified projects.

QS David Mathu, Managing Director of National Housing Corporation in his remarks committed to continue working closely with Homa Bay County and asked her to be an ambassador of greener built technology in the Country. He also emphasized that through the National Housing Levy, an additional 1900 units will be constructed.

### COUNTY SHIFTS TO LOW-COST FUEL-EFFICIENT JIKOS FOR MARKET TRADERS

The County Government of Homa Bay launched Jiko Kisasa, a climate-friendly and fuel-efficient cooking appliance that has optimal heat retention enabling faster cooking with a significant reduction in smoke emissions. H.E. Governor Gladys Wanga commissioned the cooking stoves of low-cost energy technology to be used by friend fish traders in Homa Bay Municipal Market.

The County Government, GIZ, and DACCA have partnered to adopt clean and sustainable cooking solutions to eliminate the dependence on biomass fuel in the County.

Making her remarks during the initiative, Governor Wanga expressed her gratitude to the partners for working with her administration. She further

implored the county residents to purchase and use improved cooking stoves. "The three cooking stoves are a major contributor to climate change. Together with our partners, we have produced an alternative which is an improved cooking stove that uses less firewood or charcoal "she said.

The Governor noted that improved cooking stoves will help address our emissions towards the atmosphere reducing deforestation and improving lives, especially women.

Homa Bay Risk and Vulnerability Assessment shows that 95% of households within Homa Bay County are using charcoal and firewood as their main source of cooking energy. This has contributed to massive deforestation and clearing of our hilltops.

Professor Donald Ogweno, Chief Officer for Energy disclosed that Homa Bay County had been nominated for an award for the successful efforts towards adopting clean cooking methods in the clean cooking week in Naivasha, Nakuru County.

Pamela Adede, Development Officer GIZ Lake Victoria Cluster Zone said GIZ is keen on working with the County Government to train youth and women with skills to make Improved Cooking Stoves.

Addressing the root causes of these issues requires a holistic approach that challenges harmful gender norms, promotes human rights and dignity, empowers young girls, women, and communities to make informed decisions about their health and well-being, socio-economic empowerment programs and opportunities for households as well as the implementation of strategic plans and policy frameworks that address the root causes of the triple threats.

The day was held under the theme "Our Time Is Now - Our Rights Our Future." The purpose of the day was to reaffirm commitments by both State and non-state implementers to creating a County where every girl can thrive. Specifically, the celebration aimed to promote girls' rights to education, access to healthcare, and opportunities as a means of unlocking their potential and contributing to a more equitable and inclusive society. The event took place at Mango Tree Girls High School in North.

In addition to celebrating girls' rights and potential, Homa

Bay County used the occasion to address emerging issues around teenage pregnancy among young girls as well as the triple threats. With support from Uraia Trust UNW Project, Homa Bay gave this year's celebration a governance perspective by organizing an interface meeting with women leaders in key positions drawn from the County Assembly of Homa Bay, Governance, Finance and Economic Planning, Gender, the Governor, and other key women leaders.

During this meeting, action plans were developed alongside commitments and declarations on how they would provide leadership and accountability in ending the Triple threats in Homabay through the implementation of existing relevant policies and formulation of a genderresponsive and need-specific budget. The day involved various sessions between girls, community members, and duty bearers where different issues were raised and discussed. # GOVERNOR FLAGS OFF SEEDS, SOCIAL SUPPORT TO MITIGATE DROUGHT

oma Bay County Governor HE. Gladys Wanga officially flagged off a consignment of seeds to be distributed to beneficiaries under the Drought Mitigation on Food Security and Livelihood Project.

The Project, being Coordinated by the County Department of Livestock Production and Veterinary Services, targets to reach about 1,500 households by providing Sorghum seeds, cash transfers, and animal health services to vulnerable groups in three Sub Counties of Ndhiwa, Suba North, and Suba South.

The equipment distributed includes fifty solar pumps, 20 desktops and 20 printers, 200 beehives, and 6 testing kits geared towards increasing food security in the County.

Homa Bay County Governor H.E Gladys Wanga and her Deputy, who is also the County Executive Committee Member for Agriculture H.E Joseph Oyugi Magwanga presided over the event.

Speaking at the launch, Governor Wanga underscored the importance of Farmer SACCOs. "I appeal to all the farmers to join the Ward SACCOS since my Administration is in the process of structuring all agricultural activities through these SACCOs," she said. She asked the SACCOs to recruit more members especially women and youth to strengthen the SACCOs.

She lauded the Department of Agriculture for the commendable job done during the just concluded farmer registration exercise. "I am pleased that so far Homa Bay tops the Country with 245,000 registered farmers". Governor Wanga, however, disclosed that registration in the County is still ongoing to map as many farmers as possible to the Database. The Governor said the County Government is keen to take a lead in fish since we occupy 80% of Lake Victoria, cotton farming, and growing of edible oil like sunflower, groundnuts, soya, and oil palm alongside other crops.

Deputy Governor Oyugi Magwanga, while speaking to the farmers stressed the importance of registration because unregistered farmers will not benefit from government subsidies. He further implored farmers to test their soil to ensure optimum production.

Dr. Joash Aloo, CECM for Water, Irrigation, Sanitation, Environment, Forestry, and Climate Change informed the farmers to use the toll-free number of the recently launched Climate Information Center to know the weather patterns to enable them to know the right time to plant.

NARIGP County Project Coordinator Erick Adel said they were pleased to partner with the Homa Bay County Government and asked Governor Wanga to ensure the sustainability of their activities as the Project comes to closure in a few months.



# EDUCATION: HOMA BAY COUNTY GOVERNMENT TO RELEASE BURSARIES IN DECEMBER

A sigh of relief for parents as the County Government of Homa Bay through the Department of Education, Human Capital Development and Vocational through Stakeholder's Management team embarked on plans to disburse bursaries to needy but bright students across the county.

The meeting brought together Education officials, sub-county administrators as well and ward administrators and resolved to adopt a Village Clusters Ad hoc Committees for bursary allocation. The team agreed that there will be no issuance of bursary forms instead members of the public through village clusters will be charged with the responsibility of identifying the beneficiaries.

Speaking during the event, the then Chief Officer of Education Ms. Dolphine Ochere said, "Government plans to increase its disbursement for bursaries from KES 2.5 million to KES 4 million per ward. This follows the Stakeholder's decision to adjust the kitty to meet the ever-increasing demand for educational opportunities by the residents, most of whom cannot afford fees to access secondary schools and tertiary institutions".

Consequently, number of beneficiaries will be increased from 500 to 800 per ward. Each will benefit from KES. 5000. On the Fins to Swim Scholarship, the County Government will continue funding the over 240 students across by paying full fees, shopping, transport as well as pocket money. Plans are in top gear to double the number of beneficiaries as they intend to incorporate the incoming Form ones.

Additionally, the government is set to build at least five new Early Year Education Centers in every ward this fiscal year including equipping of technical and vocational training centers.

This is geared towards creating a conducive environment for equipping the youth with relevant skills, knowledge, and competencies for gainful employment.
